

What is the NPNA?

The Normal Park Neighborhood Association (NPNA) of Ypsilanti, Michigan, formed in 1989, is the oldest neighborhood association in the City of Ypsilanti. The mission of the NPNA is to have a positive, lasting impact on the quality of life in the Normal Park neighborhood, and thus the City of Ypsilanti as a whole. Through active partnerships with other civic groups, businesses, schools, libraries, neighbors and government, the NPNA works to beautify the environment, protect property values, encourage compatible businesses, reduce crime, and foster pride in our community. NPNA covers the area bounded by Congress Street on the south, the south side of Washtenaw Avenue on the north, Mansfield Street on the west, and the west side of Summit Street on the east. All households within these boundaries are considered members of the neighborhood association automatically. Annual voluntary dues of \$10 per household per year are encouraged. Your dues, along with the proceeds from our annual yard sale registrations, make it possible for the NPNA to hold four quarterly meetings, neighborhood informational meetings, potlucks, and the ice cream social; print and distribute this newsletter and info flyers; support the NPNA website (www.normalpark.org); run the annual children's Halloween parade...and more!



Neighborly Advice

Caring for your Cat: Symptoms of Feline Heart Disease

Ed. Note: Because we have many animal lovers in this neighborhood, Joanne wanted to pass along information from her own experience that could be helpful to the cat owners in Normal Park.

Feline heart disease often suddenly appears in a cat. Cats may seem well one minute but then suddenly collapse or die. As owners of an HCM cat, we know the shock of finding that your precious cat has the fatal disease. But we also know that with medications, supplements, etc., the progression of the disease can be slowed.

Our four year old cat, Myrna Loy, was the picture of health as a kitten even with a heart murmur. When she was given steroids for a lesion, she stopped eating, began to breathe heavily, and then one night, collapsed. Animal emergency stabilized her. The next day, we met with the cardiologist who did a heart echo. We then learned that Myrna had Hypertrophic Cardiomyopathy (HCM), a fatal heart disease. The reason for the collapse was congestive heart failure (CHF) brought on by steroids. We didn't know that due to her heart murmur she shouldn't have had steroids, which promote fluid retention, and should have seen the cardiologist sooner.

Hypertrophy describes the thickening of the heart valve walls. As the heart valve thickens, it is unable to take in all of the fluid. Fluid then drains into the lungs or chest leading to CHF. Only a heart echo by a cardiologist can determine the extent of the heart disease. While almost any cat can have heart disease, certain breeds such as Maine Coon and Siamese are prone to the disease and should be tested. A cat can present with many symptoms early in life or be asymptomatic for years until older. Symptoms include a change in activity level, may be suddenly lame, screaming in pain, fainting, or confused. They will have difficulty breathing as congestion forms and will have faster chest movements. Immediate treatment is necessary for all symptoms.

Medications can slow the progression of the disease and improve heart function and prevent CHF. Additional supplements improve the overall health of the cat. Care must be taken to decrease stress in a cat's environment as stress can lead to congestion. The cost of care can be expensive and there are pet health insurances online and a line of credit called Care Credit that can help cover expenses.

While Myrna's disease is progressing, she continues to be stable even as we fight congestion.

COPAC: Join the Conversation

Community Policing Action Council (COPAC), a partnership between Ypsilanti residents and the Ypsilanti police, was originally formed to discuss safety and quality of life issues for everyone in the city of Ypsilanti. COPAC meetings are quarterly with someone representing each neighborhood or city group. All are welcome to attend the open meetings (which are kept short). Residents and local businesses can bring any concerns to the meetings, but lighter topics such as city wide and neighborhood events are also discussed. The police department always sends a representative, either an officer or the chief, and the group has open discussions about any concerns. Communication with the neighborhoods who represent themselves at these meetings has helped solve problems such as break-ins around town. Community groups such as Bike Ypsi have also presented information on their local community activities. In addition, each year COPAC holds a picnic at a park in the city that is free to everyone living in Ypsilanti. There is a COPAC email group to help disseminate information out to all the groups around the city.

Getting involved in COPAC is a great way to meet people from all over town and learn of their own respective neighborhoods, and it's another way Ypsi residents work together to become a more tightly-knit community. News from the YCS

Community partnerships are critical to creating meaningful learning opportunities for students. Ypsilanti Community Schools recognizes the importance of local alliances and has already partnered with many groups in preparing for and launching the new district. A new partnership with an environmental focus is gaining traction. Betty Brigade founder, Sharon McRill, is passionate about the environment and is working with YCS to create an environmental awareness and recycling effort that will involve students, families, staff and community members. Two fall cleanup dates have already been identified: 9:00 am - 12:00 pm, Oct. 5 and again on Oct. 19. Ms. McRill would like to turn the cleanup initiative into a learning experience and is working with science teachers to propose extra credit for research papers that chart the impact litter has on the local environment. She is also reaching out to area businesses to explore a district recycling program. Ms. McRill said community volunteers are needed to act as site coordinators for the two cleanup dates (locations will be determined soon). Ms. McRill is happy with the response of the partnership with YCS, "I love that YCS wants to participate and that they are excited about it." 

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
